Hampton. Her multiple, advanced degrees and varied work experience allow Chelsey to meet the challenges of her job head-on. A self-proclaimed workaholic, she tackles many tasks, including archiving the history of the forest, initiating new programs and classes, and motivating people to enjoy and explore nature beyond their usual expectations.

When Chelsey started working at Goodwin, she began archiving the many written works, photographs, and artifacts that document the forest's history. This was a necessity due to the deterioration of some older works over time and the fact that hungry mice had eaten away at the written word as well. To preserve the historical information that remains, she digitizes documents and photos, mitigating further deterioration and possible loss of valuable information. Artifacts are categorized, labeled, and stored appropriately. Her skills as a former librarian contribute to the organization and management of such a project, and she continues archiving to ensure future generations will have access to Goodwin's history.

Although Goodwin offers the traditional outdoor activities such as bird watching, hiking, camping, and canoeing, Chelsey's goal is to initiate programs that would let visitors view the natural world in new ways. One idea is to educate visitors about how nature was used historically. With her background in costum-

ing and a degree in history, she plans to develop a program about the use of nature in fashion, including how shells and beetles were used to make clothing and accessories. Also in the works are a class to make bath bombs from natural materials and a candle making class.

After losing her left arm in a near-fatal motorcycle accident and then working hard in recovery, Chelsey understands the problems disabled people encounter every day. As a result, she encourages people with disabilities to enjoy Goodwin and explore aspects of the outdoors they did not think were accessible. She believes life is an adventure and says, "It's not what happens to you that matters; it's how you react to what happens to you." She is a good

example of her own philosophy. She exemplifies a can-do attitude and wants to make other people with disabilities feel welcome and comfortable in nature. Policy changes, trail modifications, and increasing awareness of disabilities are just a few ways she hopes to accomplish that goal.

Chelsey is an effective mix of motivation and dedication that benefits all aspects of Goodwin Forest and inspires those who visit there to love nature as much as she does.

# Looking for a Good Book?


